My husband is in Kyiv for work, and I am in Kryvyi Rih with my son, at home. At 5 in the morning, a phone call from my husband with the words "Pack your things, the war has started" woke me up on that dreadful day. The mind of a normal

European person could not comprehend or believe it. Panic, tears, fear, uncertainty... all these emotions were running through my mind at that time. We, peaceful Ukrainians, could never have imagined that we would see missiles and drones flying over our heads.



The Michalyov Family

The Michalyov family from the Odessa region (relocated from the Donetsk region in 2014): Oksana and Maya. Hello, everyone. My name is Oksana, and I am originally from Donetsk. Donetsk was occupied in 2014, and since then, my life has been divided into before and after. Separatists took control of the city, occupying all government institutions, and Ukrainian flags disappeared overnight. People with weapons roamed the streets, doing as they pleased.

For example, I witnessed an incident where they stopped a car at gunpoint and took it from the owner. There were many terrifying stories, and people were frightened. The city was in chaos.





The Karataev Family

The Karataev Family from Kherson Oblast: Svitlana, Valeriy, and their granddaughter Alina.

Hello, my name is Svitlana. I am 53 years old, and I come from the city of Kherson. Here is my story. Everything was as usual. I was at work on February 23, 2022. When I came home, I called my eldest daughter to ask about the grandchildren and how she was doing, as she had just recovered from COVID-19.

My husband, younger daughter, granddaughter, son, and I had dinner together and went to bed. Then, at six in the morning on February 24, 2022, my daughter called and asked if I was sleeping. She said, "Don't you hear anything?"



The Paschuk Family

The war found our rather large family in Kyiv. My husband and I have four sons, a daughter-in-law, and two grandsons. At the beginning of the war, the eldest son Hordiy was 29, Nazar was 27, Danyl was 20, and the youngest Tymofiy was 7. Nazar, with his family (two children and his wife), lived in Irpin. They woke up to explosions one night, quickly

gathered their belongings, and drove 600 km to Lviv Oblast. He left his family with my sister and returned to Kyiv to join the "Azov" regiment, where he had already served in 2014.

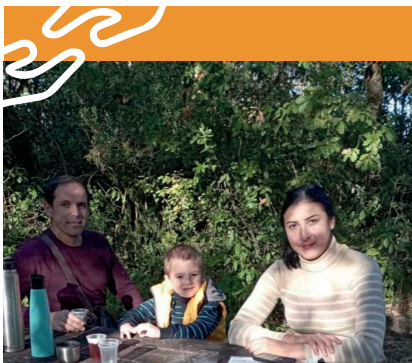




The Shevchuk Family

Hello! I'm Tatiana Shevchuk, 26 years old, and I'm the mother of a wonderful daughter named Alina Ivanova, who is 10 years old. We are from the city of Kherson, and that's where my whole life has been. I learned about the war from my older sister, who is also from Kherson. It was just an ordinary morning for me. I had to wake up early to take my daughter to school. I had a day off from work, and I had my own plans.

. But everything was shattered in an instant when my sister called our mother and told her about the war. At first, I thought she was joking, but when I saw the look on her face, I realized it wasn't a joke.



The Kravchenko Family

The Kravchenko family from the Kharkiv region consists of Natalia, Illya, and Yegor.

The war caught me, my son, and my brother in the town of Ruska Lozova in the Derhachivskiy district of the Kharkiv region. At that time, my husband was in the city of Kharkiv. On February 27th, during a lull in the shelling, my husband came and took me and our son to the

city of Kharkiv. My mother and brother decided to stay at home and wait it out. They were evacuated by the military and volunteers only in May 2022 after the liberation of the town. Meanwhile, my husband, his mother, and I headed to the city of Dnipro to stay with our relatives on February 28th.





The Gaivoronsky Family

My name is Tetiana, and I have six children whom I raise on my own. The war caught us in Solydarnoe, Donetsk region. Until May 18th, my family and I witnessed military planes flying over the city, and military vehicles stationed near the bridge. The children were scared of explosions and the sound of windows shattering, which we had to replace several times. The sound of sirens woke us up multiple times during the night, and we had

to hide in the basement. Seeing the fear in my children's eyes, hearing their cries, and worrying about my unborn child, I decided to evacuate by bus. We initially arrived in Dnipro, waiting for a train that would take us to Lviv.



Victor Vysotyuk

11.01.1981 Born in Mykolaiv, Ukraine

I started volunteering in 2020. At that time, my friend Andriy Davyduk was already traveling to villages in the Mykolaiv and Kherson regions, helping children from large and underprivileged families. Thanks to him, I became immersed in the world of volunteering. To this day, we continue to work together to help people in the Mykolaiv and Kherson regions.





Alkhimov Svitlana

We are a family of Alkhimov Svitlana and Volodya, we have two small children, We are from the Kher-son region, Kakhovsky district, Tavriysk city (now our city is occupied by Russians).On 22.03.22 Russian soldiers drove our family out of our apart-ment with a small breast-fed child on hands. We miraculously survived, we ran in what we stood to the fields, we got through the obstacles, it was very difficult with the children,

they wanted to drink and eat and were very cold when we got to our Ukrainian defenders, they gave us warm clothes, we were in house slippers, because we weren't even allowed to gather, it was terrible... I gave a newborn baby to my husband to save his life, thanks to this, the Russian soldiers did not spread my husband.



Tsymbalyuk Victoria

We were a happy young family with big plans for the future. I have known my husband Serhii since childhood, and in 2016 he declared his love and we got married. We had two daughters - Marta in 2018 and Elina in 2020. My husband and I are from Khmelnytskyi, lived and worked in Vinnytsia. Since the beginning of the full-scale war on February 24, 2022,

my husband took me and the children to a safe place, and himself, with-out telling anyone, made the decision to volunteer for the military unit. He was taken into intelligence, took part in the liberation of the Kyiv region, and from April 1, 2022, he was sent to the east of the country, where he already mastered the business of sappers.





Anna Mishurovska

My name is Anna, I am 23 years old and I am the guardian of two little girls Polina (she is 6 years old) and Olya (she is 3 years old). They are my sisters, my little princesses! Unfortunately, in such a difficult time, they were left without a mother. No, it was not the bullets that killed her, but the war in general. I know that she was very nervous and concerned about the war. From the first days of the war, my mother and sisters lived in the occupied territory.

I helped her as much as I could, asked her to leave, but she did not want to leave her house. On May 26th, my younger sister Polina called me and said that my mother had died...



Iryna Kohut

Hello!

My name is Iryna Kohut. I come from a small mining town in Donbas (Lugansk region). During the years of the war, I lost my home and my small business twice. It is very difficult, both physically and mentally. In 2014, my family and I were forced to leave our home due to the war. We moved to the city of Kharkiv. There were difficult years of adaptation to the new reality.

We hoped that we would not have to move again. We lived in Kharkiv until February 24, 2022.

Because of the beginning of the full-scale war, we left Kharkiv for a safer city in Ukraine, Ivano-Frankivsk. Friends gave us temporary shelter there.





Homyak Olga

Good day! My mother and I are internally displaced persons from Kharkiv, we lived in Saltyvka, we were hiding - stayed in the underground for two months. Then we left for the Kyiv region. Considering the critical situation, we found ourselves in a very difficult financial situation. An acquaintance advised to turn to you for help. My mother and I express our sincere gratitude to you for your program. Your help is a tangible support for us and especially for

my mother, who is suffering from diabetes and many other diseases. There is no way to return home, the apartment is in an uninhabitable condition. Thank you for your mercy and sensitive attitude! We sincerely thank everyone involved for their help! You make a great contribution to saving people!



The Zakharchenko Family

The Zakharchenko family consists of two adults and 10 children. We extend our immense gratitude to you for your assistance. Thanks to your help, we were able to purchase food and clothing, stockpile firewood, dig a well, install an

I am Anikina Lydiya Dmitrievna, I am 63 years old. I was born and grew up in the city of Kharkiv. After I suffered a hemorrhagic stroke I became disabled. I got into the program by God's providence, while staying in Kolomyia.

Thanks to the Program, I felt great relief and joy, the God supported us. I was able she to take a course of supportive treatment in June and in January , I bought the medicine that I have to take daily,

I was able to pay the apartment rent. I bought fruits, vegetables, hygiene products, body care etc. I try to spend this money carefully, since my apartment is located on the outskirts of Kharkov and during artillery fire the apartment was damaged.



Antonets Alesya

I, Antonets Alesya, 39 years old, from Mariupol, mother of tree children.

Before the war, I worked as the director of the communal institution "Speech Therapy Center". The older children studied, went to various clubs, and the younger one was at home with grandmother The war caught us out of the blue, we left with two packages of things in the city

of Dnipro, When we got there, I thought we were going for a couple of days, but really we have been living in another city for more than a year. And when we will get home ? there is no answer to this question. We learned about financial assistance from acquaintances that lived in the city of Kolomyia.





Bazna Tetyana

I am Bazna Tetyana, who came with my family from Velika Bilozerka (Zapotizhya) to Kolomyia. We settled in a shelter. And here we have learned about this program. We really need your help. without your help, I don't know how we would have gotten out of this difficult situation, because we almost spent all the savings we had while we were leaving the occupation zone. My daughter is studying in the first year of University, on a contract,

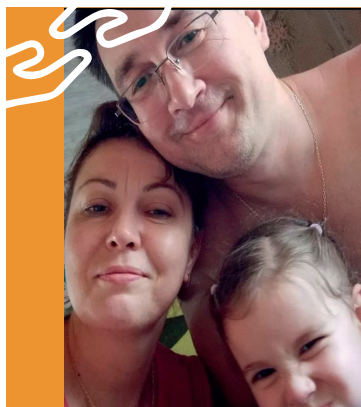




Tetyana Drot'yanko

But the events of February 24 changed everything. And life threw us all the way to another part of Ukraine. We ended up in a village near Kolo-myia. Thanks to the people, they provided a house for which only communal services had to be paid. Gathering our thoughts, gaining strength, we began to adapt to everything new.





Filatova Tamara

My name is Filatova Tamara Petrivna, born in 1946, live in the city of Kharkiv. After a full-scale invasion and constant shelling of the city, I was injured and evacuated first to Lviv, and then to Ivano-Frankivsk. I am a single woman. I have been in bed for a month, but I needed qualified help. And in this difficult moment, I met wonderful and caring people, who'd helped me get into the program. I am not personally familiar with Dell Loy Hansen, his

wife and David and Chelom Leavitt. But I'm thankful to them for their help! Over the course of a year, I was able to undergo an examination and sign up for eye surgery and purchase other necessary medications. I also bought a tonometer, glasses, basic necessities, food products and continue treatment.



Fonotova Olena

Our family, Me and my husband and two children, come from Donetsk. We encountered Russian aggression for the first time in 2014 and were forced to leave our hometown. At that time, the scale of the tragedy was not as catastrophic as in 2022. Therefore, we went not far from Donetsk, settled in Mariupol, 100 km from the city, to have the opportunity to visit relatives who stayed in Donetsk. In Mariupol, we were able to adapt to new

conditions, find work, there as well a son was born. We even managed to buy our home in 2021, six months before the war. In March 2022, real hell broke out in Mariupol ...





Gaidamaha Anastasiya

I'm Anastasia Gaidamaha. For 10 months of help. Having lost our protector, lover, friend, breadwinner, who fell in defense of the Motherland, we were left alone with our problems. After all, the war prevented us from getting married. That is why we did not receive any help from the state. The funds that we had in reserve and which were offered by not indifferent Ukrainians,

were spent on transporting the body and burial of our Andrii, a coffin, a monument, cremation, absolutely everything - unfortunately, the military unit and the state did not help us with these expenses.

Good day! My name is Iryna Haydamak. After starting of full-scale war in my country, we had to leave our city Kharkiv, which was constantly under fire, to a safer city Chernivtsi. In Chernivtsi, we met acquaintances who told us about such a program and offered a help. I had the chance to meet Dell Loy Hansen and his wife and David and Chelom Leavitt in person. Once again I sincerely want to thank you for such support and great help!

My name is Halyna. My family and I are from the city of Bucha, Kyiv region.

Rocket fire, the sound of helicopters and complete obscurity - this is how our day began at 5 am on February 24. Next - days without sleep, constant reading of the news, occupation in Bucha,

expectation that everything will end quickly and complete uncertainty of how to live on. We lost our happy past lives, jobs, any hopes due to a full-scale invasion, but thankfully none of my family members died, for which I am extremely grateful to God!

It so happened that on February 24, 2022, when a full-scale Russian military invasion of Ukraine took place, my whole family came to my parents in the village of Bucha community. My name is Alexander Lysenko, I am 70 years old and I live in the city of Bucha. I knew about the war from my parents who went through it in 1945, but I didn't even think that my kids and grandchildren would live in such trouble as the war. I met the war in Bucha and spent the entire occupation also in Bucha, I didn't leave, because they were shooting in our street, just near my home. I had to go through a difficulties, the unknown of tomorrow,

the cold and the lack of food were especially scary. But I survived and live on. I am grateful for the support and for the fact that I can live and be treated. Thank you for your confidence in today's day in such a difficult time for us.



Ivan Mykhailovych Pinchuk

I am Ivan Mykhailovych Pinchuk, born in 1940, and I used to live with my family of five at Vokzalna Street, Apartment 171.

When the war started, we moved to a shelter at Lyceum No. 5. On February 27, 2022, our apartment was destroyed. It was completely burned down, and there was nothing left.

During the occupation, I stayed in Bucha.

There were 73 of us in the school basement. We survived in harsh conditions without water, electricity, gas, or food. Despite the shelling and searches by the invaders, we tried not to lose our optimism and believed in Victory.





Kateryna Lavrynets

My name is Kateryna Lavrynets. I am an displaced person from Chernihiv who came to Kolomyia with my family last March. Together with my daughter, we lived in a shelter on the street. I. Franko. There we met Dell Loy Hansen and David Levitt and their wives who came to support us. Moral and especially material support was very important for our family and in general for all families who left their homes due to military aggression.

We would like to express our sincere gratitude to our American friends who cared about everyone's fate, every month we received cards with financial assistance, which allowed us to cover everyday expenses and feel more confident.

My name is Karpenko Nadia, I am from Zaporizhya. I was born in 1948 in the village of Teofipol Khmelnytska region We had a large family with five children. I was 13 years old when father died. My mother worked as a nurse in a hospital and it was very difficult for her to make ends meet with 5 children. That's why we were sent to a boarding school.

During my long life, I saw a lot of grief and of joy. But I could never have thought that in my old age I would have to suffer from the mean war. Now I am 75 years old. I live with my husband. His name is Oleksiy Karpenko, born in 1938, he also comes from Teofipol.





Kopiyka Viktoriya

My name is Viktoriya Kopiyko. I got into the program thanks to the fact that I gave shelter to people from the occupied territories... At first, a family from the city of Rubizhny, Luhansk region, lived with me with their pets (8 cats), and then the family from Bilozerka, Zaporizhia region (5 people) moved in, relatives from Bilozerka are also coming to them very often, I am glad that there is an opportunity to shelter them all, they have

already settled in our town of Kolomyia... The war changed the lives of all of us and We must stick together. Now a little about myself: I'm Viktoria, Sasha's mother, who is a child with a severe form of disability.



Kostyantyn Kyrylenko

My name is Kostyantyn Kyrylenko, I lived near the sea, in the very heart of the city of Mariupol. I moved to Mariupol in 2012 from a small town in the Donetsk region Druzhkivka I have personally watched how rapidly the city has been developed and blossomed over the past 5 years. Where every resident had the same rights and

opportunities for their own self-development and aspirations. I never believed that such a "dirty" war could be possible in 21 century. Therefore, the morning of the 24th February 2022 was something close to impossible, unreal for me.





Koronnik Oksana

Hello! My name is Koronnik Oksana, I am 47 years old. I live in the village Borodyanka, Kyiv region. I have a husband Yuriy and two sons Timofey, who is 13 years old and Dmytro, who is 25 years old. Before the war, we lived at our place of residence. I have been working as a nurse in the therapeutic department more than 25 years. . On February 24, 2022, when the invasion of Ukraine began, my husband and younger son and I were at home.

Our city began to be shelled from tanks and hailstones in the first days of the beginning of the war. It was very scary and painful to watch all this. Russian soldiers began to capture our city. We decided to leave. As it was dangerous to stay home.



The Kosareva Family

Good day!!!

The family of Kosareva Antonina, from the Donetsk region of the Volnovakha district, is very grateful for the help in such a difficult time. We were forced to leave our homes (because our hometown is still on the front line, where constant hostilities are taking place - the infrastructure is destroyed, the city has been without electricity and gas since April 18) and move to Cherkasy region, and later we had to

take away parents who are 85 and 90 years old. Our homes are not fit to live there - our parents' apartment destroyed by gunfire, my husband's house burned down, so there is nowhere to return to!

Good day! My name is Kosareva Anna. My family and I, including my little son, who is now 1.8 years old, are sincerely grateful to you for your help, which is now a salvation for our family in such a difficult time. We are from the Donetsk region, Volnovasky district, Velyka Novosilka Township.

In March, we were forced to leave our home under shelling. Now we have not been home for eight months!

However, we cannot go home yet, at this moment it is the front line, which is constantly under shelling, airstrikes, and phosphorus bombs. Many houses were damaged and destroyed.



Kosikov Oleg

We are the family, Kosikovy: Tetyana, Oleg, Lisa. Before the war, we lived in the village of Velika Bilozerka, Zaporizhzhia region.

When the war began on February 24, 2022, Russian troops entered our village already on February 26, 2022. They felt free in our village, as in their home. Next to them, we were able to endure two months, we were very afraid

for our daughter. And on April 28, 2022, we left our home. We were very scary to overcome the 24 blocks of the Rashist troops posts, but we understood that we were saving our future, our daughter. We were going into the unknown and did not know what we were to await in the future.





Kosikova Yuliya

Dear David and Chelom Leavitt and Dell Loy Hansen an Julie Hansen ... we are the very people who were lucky enough to meet you and receive your help. At the beginning of the war, our family moved to Kolomyia from Bilozerka Zaporizhyya. Having lost the opportunity to live, work and study in our hometown, we found ourselves in a very difficult situation with our three children.. In an unfamiliar place, without work, without means of subsistence,

we did not have the opportunity to rent a house... It hurts to remember the despair and fear we experienced. First, the news about the war, then leaving everything you have and fleeing the world before your eyes, and everything here seems to be ... everything is fine - we are far from the occupation, and there are no explosions here, but I was shackled by such fear ... what next?



The Kotsar Family

February 24th - I still remember that morning in detail. I woke up at six o'clock to get the children ready for school and kindergarten. Before I could even get out of bed, a notification from Google appeared on my phone: "Putin announced the start of a military operation in Ukraine at 5 am." "War," flashed through my mind. Through tears, I read the news, one update after another. Fear. And it wasn't fear for myself but for my children;

tears flowed uncontrollably. My family is not in the occupied territory but close to it. We are from Dnipropetrovsk. Daily sirens, missile strikes. You never know where one will land today or if the missile defense system will intercept it.





The Koznodi Family

Good evening, we are Koznodi family. Thank you very much, we have three children, one of them is under care. The husband only able to work. Unfortunately, I am very sick now, I have a big problem with my back, it is difficult to walk, the children are sick. Your aid almost all spent on food and medicine, and, thank God, for warm clothes, which are not cheap now. We have been without electricity for 5 days, and were charging our phones in

random people's cars. I thank you all, who involved in this, sincerely. It is very scary now, when winter is coming and we do not know what will happen next, whether we will have to leave, or what we will live for. We do not have a job for our support and state aid is small. Thank you.



Koval Oleg

We are the Koval family from Kakhovka. Our family is facing difficult trials. Thanks to your program, we can survive in this war. We sincerely thank you from the bottom of our hearts.





Kulchitskaya Yuliya

Herewith I'd like to greet all the founders of the fund, all those who were involved in the assistance Ukrainians in a difficult hour! My name is Yuliya Kulchytska. At the same time, my whole family was in a very difficult situation. On April 8, 2022, at the station in the city of Kramatorsk, I and my family came under missile attack. Unfortunately, I was very injured. But luckily my daughter and husband didn't get no wounds.

I got very bad injuries on my legs. The doctors in Kramatorsk could not help me, so they sent to the hospital in the city of Dnipro. I had my right leg amputated, and they tried to save the left. Doctors saved my life.



The Krasovskyi Family

The massive rocket attacks in Kyiv made us to move to the west of Ukraine. However, the half of my family stayed there, in Kyiv. My mother, brother and me moved to the city in the west of Ukraine called Chernivtsi. Also we moved, because my school didn't have a bombshelter, so there weren't any lessons. we had to share the budget with our relatives from Kyiv and we didn't have enough money. What is more we had to rent an apartment. This money allowed us to buy food and medicine. So we are very-very grateful to you, without you it would be a challenge to live there normally for almost a year. Thank you again and again

Hello. My name is Julia. We are a family from the city of Mariupol, because of the war, my husband and two 4-year-old children left the city under shelling and airstrikes.

We currently live in the city of Ivano-Frankivsk. Where we met Iryna, who introduced us to Yaroslava and told us about the program. We rent housing, found a job, children go to kindergarten. During this year, we were able to establish a new life

and make sure that our children did not experience the war disaster. We lost everything, but thanks to this program and efforts, we were able to move forward. During the program, unfortunately, we did not have the opportunity to meet Dell Loy Hansen in person, but we thank them as much as you can imagine.



Kurilin Sergii

the children's regional hospital, thank God that you can pay for the tests with a card, which is a great support for us. Health to all involved, low bow, peace.





Malkiel Malvina

My name is Malkiel Malvina, I am a hairdresser, I am 33 years old. Before the beginning of the full-scale invasion of the Russians, I lived and worked in the city of Izyum near Kharkiv. When the Russian occupiers entered the city, the hell began. My mother and I were hiding with friends at the other end of the city, and at that time a huge bomb was dropped on our house with a direct hit from an airplane. Nothing remained of the house itself, the summer

house and the garage were also swept away by the shock wave. Then my mother and I decided to leave for Kharkiv, because living under occupation was unbearable. Of course, Kharkiv was also heavily shelled, but for a while our relatives gave us a shelter.



Mavrynska Yuliya

My name is Yuliya Mavrynska. I was born in the Kyiv region, Boryspil district, Pereyasavske village. I am on maternity leave to take care of two children, Zahary, a 4-year-old boy, and Katya, a two-and-a-half-year-old girl. During the full-scale war, I was in Western Ukraine. First in the village Solotveno then moved to Chernivtsi, where I lived with my children at the lyceum school. . Dell Loy Hansen and his wife, Mykola Luchak and

Yaroslava Podunai came to us there. We met in the assembly hall of the lyceum, so my children and I became participants of the program. For a year, I think the most important thing is that my relatives, thank to God, that they are all alive.





Mykhailova Viktoriya

Good day! My name is Mykhaylova Victoria. My husband Mykhailov Andriy and our two daughters Yulia and Anna have been displaced persons since 2014. At that time we lived in Makiivka, Donetsk region Then we had our own apartment, for which we paid off the loan just before the beginning of the occupation of Donetsk region. For us, the war started in 2014. The eldest daughter was at that studied in Kharkiv in the 2nd year of the Academy of

Your help saved us from hunger and cold, because we had to buy food, and there was no work at all. There were no windows either, but thanks to your grace, we have already paid a little.

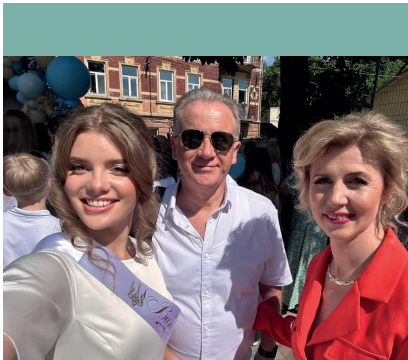




Nakonechny Vitaliy

Oleinichenko Olga

Hello) My name is Olga Oleynichenko. I come from Donetsk region. Now I live in a village in Prykarpattia. I'm internally displaced person since 2014. I'm a teacher-psychologist by education. I lead a group in an after-school institution and take care of the MiCuLab shelter for IDPs. In March 2022, I by my own organized a small shelter for IDPs in rented office.

Later, with the help of local residents, friends, organizations our shelter became "elite", as it was jokingly called by immigrants from our community. After all, the main idea was to create decent conditions for temporary displaced people, and we succeeded.





The Parhomenko Family

In our house at the address of Kolychivka, before the start of the war, 4 men lived permanently. From the first day of the Russian aggression, our house was near a roadblock. We began to help our servicemen and set up a canteen for soldiers. During the first big battle, a shell hit our house, and then a fire started and it was completely destroyed. We have lost everything we have earned in our lives.

We really hope for help in rebuilding our house, where we would be able to return to live again. Without your support, we will not be able to survive. May God bless you!

We are two brothers, Pavelko Oleksiy and Pavelko Serhiy. Originally from the Zaporizhzhia region, the village of Velyka Bilozerka, which is currently under occupation. During the year, we all became more united and learned to help each other and those in need, which is very important now.

We are from Zaporozhe region. We are Peresada family.

We got to your project in Kolomyia at the shelter. We, still little-known internally displaced persons with different, sometimes very interesting lives, sat and waited for a delegation from abroad. We only knew that the delegation was English-speaking. A large group of people arrived, a translator, filming, so many smiling people.

Basically, everyone knew what the conversation was about, but the level of spoken English did not allow me to tell my story. So everyone talked in Ukrainian about their pre-war life, about their dreams, about their fears. There were tears, laughter, and sympathy.



Olga Horeshnyk

My name is Olga Horeshnyk, 69 years old.

I am a forced migrant from the city of Kharkiv.

Peaceful life ended for me on February 24, 2022. We woke up from loud explosions outside the window. The glass was shaking. It was clear what happened. Something happened that I refused to believe the whole last month, although there were numerous warnings

- the war brought by Russia. It confusion came, how to live on, what to do every next day. It became scary just go outside. Daily shelling of Kharkov began. All shops closed immediately, and there was a lack of ordinary products and things like toilet paper, onions, carrots.





The Petryakov Family

The Petryakov family. 02/24/2022 changed the lives of millions and, of course, did not bypass our family. My wife and I and our three children could not even imagine that everything could change so much.

The first couple of days, I could not collect myself at all, because I could not believe it. Life has stopped. After the first shock had passed, I realized that I had to do something.

I had never done volunteer work before, but I understood that this was the “mite” that I could contribute to our common victory. Your help helps to focus on volunteering and not think about how to survive and how to support the family and children.

I am Alina Prozorovska, from the village of Velyka Bilozerka (Zaporizhia region), which is unfortunately currently occupied by the Russian military. 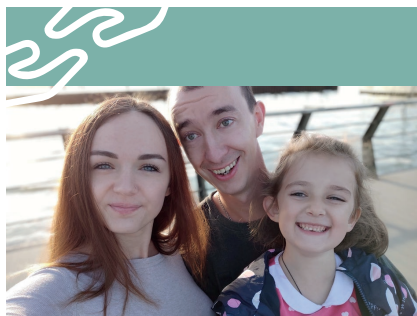




The Shulgach Family

Shakirova Svitlana

My name is Shakirova Svitlana. I am from the city of Mariupol. Unfortunately after 24 of February 2022, I with my 7-year-old daughter left our home because war came. My husband is a military man, a junior sergeant of the Border Service defended our city of Mariupol from the enemy, but was captured.

It's been more than a year that he is still in captivity of the Russian Federation, I was left alone with my child. Now with my daughter and I live in the city of Kyiv and are very much waiting for our dad, my husband. We got into the program thanks to Valeria, she learned about my story from me and wanted to help us.





Shuliko Nataliya

We are an ordinary family from Mariupol. I, husband Evgeny, son Vladyslav 14 years old and daughter Maria 8 years. The war found us at home on the first day. We went out by some miracle on March 14 from the surrounded and burning city with neighbors and closest people.

We left with a bag and two backpacks of things. But the most important thing is that we managed to leave with the children. We got to the volunteer shelter in Vinnytsia region completely confused.

Greetings, my name is Shuranova Liliia, I am from the city of Kharkiv. When the war started, we were forced to leave for another city, where we met very sensitive people who helped us find housing and at least come to our senses after what we saw. My child and I went with the necessary things and documents, we really believed that everything would end quickly and we would return home. We got to the city of Chernivtsi,

very beautiful, but so foreign. Then Mykola told us that there are people who want to help Ukrainian families, and we met with them.

I am, Yuriy Smorodin (born in 1957), a combatant of the Ukrainian Armed Forces with my wife Smorodina Natalia (born in 1957) with great gratitude for your care and help. forced to leave their homes. In March 2022, someone from other cities, who was going further abroad, constantly spent the night or lived for several days in my apartment.





Stepura Daryna

My name is Daryna, I am Ukrainian, I was born in the city of Irpin, Kyiv region. All my life I lived in my hometown, with my little family, mother, grandmother and sister who is 16 years older than me. This year I will be 40 years old, I have a son Nikita. It a seriously ill child, he is disabled, he is 16 years old. Despite his difficult condition, he is very happy, smiling and gentle boy This is an incredibly positive child who often smiles.

This is my soul, my meaning of life. We live together, in a house left to me by my mother. With father of my son, we communicate very rarely. I have no help from him. Our family budget are funds from the state for the care for a disabled child, which are barely enough even for the necessary hygiene and nutrition.



Struzhkina Valentina

I, Valentina Dmitrivna Struzhkina, lived in the city of Donetsk, left the occupied city and lived with her husband in town Volodymyrivka. We went there to visit relatives when we were in our hometown the war started in Donetsk, we thought of hiding there for a while. But it last for 8 years. And in 2022, Volodymyrivka became the front line. On today there are practically no small towns. It's been more than a year the city has no water, heating, electricity,

houses are destroyed. My husband and I managed to leave at the beginning of active hostilities thanks to volunteers. My husband is bedridden with ALS - he could no longer move on his own. In the fall of 2022, my husband needed emergency medical care, because he lost the ability to breathe on his own due to lung atrophy.





Taratuta Oleksiy

Hello

We are Aleksey and Olga Taratuta from Mariupol. We accidentally learned about support from the Dell Loy Hansen Foundation. It happened in May last year. It was unexpectedly and touching. Dell Loy Hansen came personally to us with his wife Julie as well as David Leavitt and Chelom Leavitt. They spoke to us, listened our stories. Many thanks to them from us. We are still in Kolomyia.

There is no special plans yet, but mother fulfilled her dream. We are praying for victory and wish you all the best.

Tatiana, 46 years old, Ukrainian, mother of two wonderful children: Oleg - 15, Maria - 8, divorced, disabled of the 3rd group, I work as a human research manager. My war began in 2014 in Donetsk, when the car dealership where I worked was hit by a shellings and awfully destroyed (near the airport). Then I and my husband packed a suitcase, took the child and left for Vinnytsia, with the hope that in two months we will

be able to return to liberated Donetsk. Unfortunately, it didn't work out as we wanted. In Vinnytsia, we had a second child - Mashenka, after which I had aggressive metastatic form of breast cancer was discovered, it took a long time treatment: surgery, chemistry, radiation, hormone therapy.





Thirkeltaub Oleksandr

My name is Thirkeltaub Oleksandr, I am 42 years old. I come from the Zaporizhzhia region.

Orihiv, my city stands unbreakable - a city that has been beaten and destroyed under the racist fire, broken, the whole land is on fire, without electricity, without gas and without water, broken houses, schools, gardens - pain, despair, mourning, it is unbearably painful to watch my city dying. . The war has brought me and my family with

a small child on March 6, 2022 to a wonderful, picturesque place in the western Ukrainian in city of Kolomyia. I have been living here for 1 year and 3 months. Local government with volunteers provided us with help and shelter in the form of a shelter, where until now we live as a whole family.



Tetyana Dmitrieva

My name is Tetyana Dmitrieva. I am a resident of the city of Kharkiv. I am 47 years old. I have a higher education, by profession - a chemist - technologist of the production of varnishes, paints and polymers. I worked until February of 2022 by profession. I have a son. His name is Danilo. He is a full-time student. This year he defends his bachelor's degree.

He is 21 years old. My husband's name is Vitaly. As you know, on February 24, 2022, a disaster occurred in our country. Our neighbor, Russia, lost his mind. Even in nightmares it was impossible to imagine this. They started right away shelling the city from the RSV, and there was even an attempt by the Russian army to enter the city. It was terribly.

Even, despite the explosions, crops were sown and harvested the fields but I had to leave with my youngest son Anton, because at that time in there were nothing in shops, pharmacies, post offices was closed. Of course, I was filled with horror!

Coincidentally or not, we ended up in Kolomyia, in the Frankiv region. We have not personally met the founders of the project, but we are looking forward to it, We grateful that there are such people in the world who responded and accepted Ukrainian families in such a difficult period. In 2014, the youngest son underwent a course of chemotherapy and irradiation and supervision by narrow specialists is still necessary for us. Thanks to financial assistance, we were able to equip educational place, more attention was paid to the restoration of the spine, joints, valgus.
