I, Tetyana Vereshchagina, and my family lived happily in our house until February 24. The war started and my husband went to the front. The Russians reached our village. And from March 6, heavy shelling began. My family and I sat in the cellar all the time. It was very scary. The guys, the Ukrainian military, who repelled the attacks

near my house, told us to run away. We left on the morning of March 6, and by evening my house had already been destroyed and my family was left without a home. I'm ashamed now that I don't even remember the faces of those guys who said run. They are my guardian angels.





The Yudin Family

We are a family of Yudins from the city of Chuguiv, in the Kharkiv region.

I will never forget the morning of February 24, I remember it minute by minute. I, like millions of Ukrainians, woke up at 5 in the morning to the sound of an explosion. My husband was at work on the night shift, and I was alone with my 4-year-old daughter. I did not understand what I should do. We stayed in our city for almost a month, and the rest

of us couldn't bear to live in constant fear and under shelling, decided to leave for a safer place. Unfortunately, we cannot return to our home yet, it is very painful to see familiar and familiar places in the news that are now destroyed.





Yurchenko Anna

Hello! I am Anna Yurchenko!

I am 39 years old. I was born, lived and worked in the city of Kherson. I am an accountant by profession and most of the time she worked in the service sector - a manager in banks. Six months before the start of the war in Ukraine, I was being treated at the Kherson oncology clinic. With the beginning of hostilities in April 2022, I left my hometown for Ivano-Frankivsk to sister for a few months.

On May 22, I moved to the city of Odesa to continue treatment. From May 22 to today, I underwent three more operations (the last one took place in Kyiv on May 24 of this year). I am infinitely grateful to everyone involved in this help, because thanks to it I was able to do the last two operations. THANK YOU VERY MUCH! LOW BOW!!!!

My name is Kateryna Goreshnyk, I am 36 years old. I live in Kharkiv. I have wonderful daughter Polina, 11 years old.

Our peaceful peaceful life ended on February 24, 2022 at 5 am. Dreams were shattered with the first shots. We had to leave our home, in a bomb shelter there were no choices for us. We left our house without knowing when we can return. Once upon a time, I believed that goodness does not exist,

but the war showed that there are those people who are ready to help in difficult times.we were sheltered in Chernivtsi by very kind people, the family of Mykola Luchak. Thanks to Mykola, my daughter and I got into the program of assistance to Ukrainian refugees. This is such a scary word, refugee.

some money for reconstruction. Of cause it's not enough. But the land plot is ours and we dreamed once we will be able to restore our house. Personally with you I have never met, but I feel as if I knew you. Thank you, dear friends, for your help.

From Lugansk region, 19 years old, both of her parents are on service in Ukrainian Army. She is a student now in Military University.

With your assistance we were able to be more independent from them. Thank you again. You supported us and our families more then year. God be with all your deeds!






Budai Anna

We were living in Mykolaiv region.

It was almost morning when the wife heard the explosions. I went out and looked from the mountain, Mykolaiv was shining. Everything was in fire in war.

Relatives, loved ones, friends left, but we remained without the opportunity to leave because enemies pushed us from all sides. In basement and staying under the river, in shelters, the children became ill.

There was nothing to feed them until volunteers appeared they started providing help. House near the road. They saw the fighting, how the Russian army passed through the 'meat grinder' and burned together with the equipment.





Duhno Viktoriya

We are family from Chernigov.

We have met you in Kosiv in school, where were gathered as displaced persons. You listened to our stories, you express sympathy and we shared our feeling with you. Then you switched a song that was especially written for Ukrainians and all the world cried. Originally I am from Chernigov region. It is near the border with Russia. In June we returned home, but we can't recognize our home,

our city and our house. Some of our neighbors were killed. Someone disappeared. Our house was destroyed without windows and robed. Thanks toy your help we made some renovations and buy new things.





The Dyadenko Family

Peace to all... I, Dyadenko Olga Petrivna, a Ukrainian, lived with my family in the village of Pervomaiske, Mykolaiv district, Mykolaiv region, before the war. The war forced us to leave our native village. The Red Cross organization took my family away to Mykolaivn, and a month later volunteers took us to the village of Yavoriv, Kosiv district, Ivano-Frankivsk region, where we lived with other migrants in the local lyceum for 4 months.

From here, my son was taken to the war. He died on July 2, 2022, in the village of Dolyna Slovyansk district of the Donetsk region. He was buried in the village of Yavoriv, as there were military operations there. Local authorities, residents, and employees of the lyceum helped us a lot.





Galina Matskova

My name is Galina Matskova, I am from the city of Makiyivka, Donetsk region. I have a husband and a 6-year-old daughter, who graduated from the 1st grade, in Irpin – the city near Kyiv. On February 25, 2022, during shelling, we were forced to leave Irpin and moved to the city of Kolomyia. There we found out about this opportunity to receive help. I knew Yaroslava Podunay a little because she is from Makiyivka too.

Thanks to your help we survived in this most difficult time. My husband did not have a permanent income for half a year, and the house had to be rented. Thanks to this program, we were able to pay for the rent, buy everything for our daughter to go to school, bought a retainer for our daughter.





Kalashnikova Kateryna

My name is Kateryna. I am 37 years old. I have a wonderful family - my husband, Dmytro, 43 years old, and my son, Yevgeny

13 years. In 2014, war came to our home. At that time, we lived in the city of Yasinuvata. We wereforced to leave for a safer place. So we settled in the city of Kramatorsk. But war is not stopped, but on the contrary gained

momentum. Therefore, in March 2022, we ran away from the war further... So we ended up in the city of Chernivtsi, where we met with wonderful people Dell Loy Hansen, David and Chelom Leavitt. This one the meeting took place at the school where we found shelter.





Kapranov Oleg

My name ia Kapranov Oleg.

I am a single father and I am raising a 3-year-old son. We lived near the city of Zaporizhzhia in the central part of Ukraine. Like all other families, our lives changed after February 24, 2022.

Zaporozhye very quickly became a front-line city, where constant shelling destroyed houses to their foundations. My son was very afraid of the loud sounds of shelling, we constantly

went down to the basement to feel safe. . Our city was the reception center for refugees from Mariupol and other southern cities of Ukraine, and in the first weeks I myself helped people leave, was a volunteer at the refugee center.





Kolomyya four shelters

3 cards were given to Kolomyya four shelters. At the beginning there were three shelters, the fourth one was opened in February 2023.

The many was spent on restoration works, basement works, purchase of necessary equipment for kitchen and for sanitary rooms. The heating system was installed, we have bought two generators and we also bought

several times petrol for them. Also we have bought all necessary instruments for outdoor works. We established a children room with all necessary facilities, a social worker and a teacher is working there and mothers can work part time.





Kovtun Vira

In Buchi, on February 25, 2022 a fight broke out on the street near the railway station.

I was at home at that time. They started shooting at the surrounding houses.

Thanks to God, I came out alive and unharmed of my house, which was destroyed to the walls. On March 11, I was evacuated to Buch and I was rescued by bus all the way to Kosiv, in Ivano-Frankivsk.

It was there that I met David and Dell Loy, they gathered us in the teacher's room. I told him my story. We took a photo as a memory. I have now returned to Bucha. We are rebuilding. Trying to rebuild.





Kravchenko Victoria

My name is Kravchenko Victoria! I am a mom of three wonderful kids. Maxim, he is 18 years old, Artem is 12 and Julechka is 8.

Six years ago my husband died and I was left alone with three children in my arms. Almost two years ago, I met a very good man Alexei, but unfortunately he is still there, in the Donetsk region. Yes,I forgot to tell you that I'm from the Donetsk region,a mining town of Rodinskoe.

When the war began, we had to flee our native city, with one suitcase and documents. The road was long and after three days we arrived in Chernivtsi, where we had to live in a kindergarten, then in a school, then in one apartment and in another.





Yuriy Kush

I, Yuriy Mykhailovych Kush, a forced migrant from the city of Mariupol, I am 76 years old, born in 1947, left Mariupol on May 9, 2022. I had to take a detour through Russia, Latvia, Lithuania, and Poland to Lviv. For the first month and a half, my wife and I lived with our daughter and grandson in Lviv, in an apartment where caring, warm-hearted Lviv residents accepted them. My wife, daughter and grandson left Mariupol at the beginning of the war.

Our friends, also from Mariupol, suggested that we, my wife and I, move to the city of Kolomyia, Ivano-Frankivsk region, and settle in a shelter, which we did. Ms. Iryna Igorivna is engaged in the provision and development of this shelter. We are very, very grateful for her work, dedication and attitude towards people who are in trouble!





Kutepova Liliya

We met wilt you in Kolomyya. We are family from Lugansk Region.

All this time we were loving in shelter in Kolomyya, trying to start our life anew. I was working as pharmacist, husband was trying to work whenever it could be possible. With you we met in shelter in general meeting when you came in may 2023. I was with very big belly in front of me. Thank you!

At this time I still live in Kolomyia together with husbands morther, and my little daughter, which I was born here.

When the war started, I took my mother and brother to my place, a week later, when the rockets started flying even more and hit houses and Russian troops approached our village in the Kyiv region, I decided to take my family out. we were going, just forward. We got to Chernivci. In May, David, Dell Loy and his wife and Chelom Leavitt visited us. You are like angels who helped us all year in such a difficult time. Thanks to your help, I was able to feed my family, pay utilities, and even clothe my children a little. Thank you very much for your help, I bow to you!





Merkulova Yana

Hello, my name is Yana, I was born in Mariupol 30 years ago. I was living with my family usualy life in Mariupol during this time: the members of my family had a job, after aducation I was working secretary of court process. After 24.02.22 our life was changed by Russian's attack to Ukraine. Mariupol became ocupated by russian military forces. Our homes were breaking on the last days of March. Now 90% of our Mariupol is destroyed.

At the first day of Russian's intansion to the territory of Ukraine I was in Kiev, my family was in Mariupol at that monent. They left Mariupol and Donetskii district in spring and came to me.





Marchenko Anna

Hello, we are from Lugansk region. There are 6 of us. 4 children and two parents.

We flee from the war and settled in Kolomyya. They here gave us shelter. It was very difficult to leave everything you have and start from nothing. But thanks to your help we were supported and our children had something to eat and to wear.

Now we are planning to leave for abroad to look for happier life in Europe. Thank you for your help.





Myhailovska Mariya

I was living with my daughter, 2 grandchildren, and a great-granddaughter (2 months) in Bucha. On 24.02.2022 we have already flown rockets and airplanesoOver our heads We didn't know if it was ours or not. Within a minute, explosions and smoke were heard from the direction of Gostomel. We ran to Kindergarten No. 6 "Yablunka" and went down to the basement. The floor was covered with cardboard boxes. We stayed there until 10.03.22.

Under constant explosions. On February 27, a convoy of heavy enemy vehicles was destroyed on Vokzalnaya Street. Russians with Kadirov people were running around. The director of the kindergarten organized order in the room. Six men were on duty at the four entrances, maintaining order and preparing meals.





Misko Svitlana

I am blind form my birth, my husband blind from other reasons, we are together more then 40 years. We have 3 sons and 4 grandsons. Unfortunately they are all live in another state.

When the war started we were evacuated abroad, but we didn't like it there, we returned. In Kolomyya they give us a room in a shelter and told us about your program.

We were happy, we were able to buy not only food but also some cooking equipment and clothes. You know blind people cook very specially, we need to be alone to control the space. So your help was in right time.





Oleksiy Nakonechny

Hello, we are the Oleksiy Nakonechny family. At the height of the war, it so happened that we had to flee to nowhere. Our home was completely destroyed by the Russians. The most we expect today is its reconstruction. We miss our native home very much. At that time , task #1 was simply to save ourselves, since we lost many friends and neighbors on our land. I have already written several times that of the lost material things, I regret the photos the

most, unfortunately we cannot return them, we will rebuild and purchase everything else. It was through such thorny paths that we got to Kolomyia, where we were lucky enough to meet extraordinary people Dell Loy Hansen, his wife Julie and the Leavitts.





Serhiy Nebov

Good day! My name is Serhiy Nebov, I am a yoga instructor, I am 51 years old, I live in Kharkiv. Since the beginning of the full-scale invasion of the Russians, like most of the citizens of our city, I have lost my job. When the intensity of shelling and bombing became unbearable, my daughter and I decided to go to Western Ukraine for a while, in the city of Ivano-Frankivsk, to visit friends. We were kindly sheltered by the family of Kostiantyn

Polyakov and Lyudmila Doroshenko, where we helped them in volunteer work: the production of dry lunches for soldiers of the Armed Forces.





Ochkus Anna

My name is Ochkus Anna, I am 19 years old, I used to live in the city of Zaporizhzhia. After the full-scale invasion, I had to leave my hometown to the Ivano-Frankivsk region. I started receiving your help here in Kolomya. After the conversation and providing the necessary information, I began to receive help. I want to say that it was the financial assistance that helped to realize and equip myself with everything necessary.

Since I took only clothes from home. Thanks to help, we can live a full life, this applies to products, medical services, household. This is a huge help for all of us.

Volodymyr, man, 69 years old, retired Son Andriy, seriously ill Borodyanka, Kyiv region 02.03.2022 during airstrikes on the city, 500 kg. with high-explosive aerial bombs, artillery fire, hail, and tank shells on our house, persecuted by racist inhumans for an active pro-Ukrainian position, taken out with the family by a fire engine, and then by bus to Kolomyia.

During evacuation there was the air shelling on Train station in Kramatorsk in April 2022, my 7 years son was killed on my yes. My daughter was seriously wounded and I was injured. We spent in hospital some time, then we moved to Vinnytsya and in Volunteer center someone told me about your program. I applied. And got help. Thanks to your help I was able treat my daughter, myself not only physically but also and emotionally and

The war found me at home, in a relatively safe corner of Ukraine. Although only 70km. from my house in the morning of February 24 also sounded bombs exploded.

We are the Shkurat family, we lived in the city of Kharkiv on Northern Saltivka. On February 24, 2022, in the morning, around 5:00 a.m., the shelling of our neighborhood began. At first, the shelling was cruise missiles and bombing from airplanes because a military unit was located near our house. Which was completely bombed. Our house was also damaged. After the first shelling, we hid in the basement of our high-rise building.

A few hours later, from the side of the city of Belgorod, the Russian Federation, having violated the state border, the regular armed forces of the Russian Federation approached the shelter in the city of Kharkiv, which began to fire very heavily at the shelter with various types of weapons, our neighborhood - Northern Saltivka...





The Sobol Family

Dear friends! First of all, we thank you for your help and your big hearts. For the fact that you do not leave our compatriots, Ukrainians, in our great and terrible trouble, which came to our country last year and still does not leave us. We lived in Donbas, in the flourishing city of Sloviansk, but the war forced us to leave our homes, so we ended up in Ivano-Frankivsk regio. Thanks to our volunteers, we found shelter in a shelter in Lysets Medical Center

and lived with my little granddaughter Marichka in the same room as refugees from Brovary, and then with women from Kharkiv. Now we have moved again to our shelter in Lysets, we have to pay for our accommodation, and if it wasn't for your kind help, we wouldn't know where to go and where to live.

It was difficult - when we arrived last spring - there were remnants of the house all over the garden and even on the neighboring plots, and some of the bushes died because no one watered them.






The Stenyuk Family

I, Stepanova Anna, from Mariupol. I was born in the city of Donetsk, but because of the Russian invasion, I with my husband and son moved to Mariupol in 2014. In 2022, in March (25.03.2023), we left the city which was occupied. On March 31, we were on the territory of Ukraine. In Chernivtsi, in Lyceum No. 12, in which we lived and met Dell Loe Hansen and his wife, David and Chelom Leavitt. It was in May. My family and I moved to Kyiv in June.

My husband got a job we rented an apartment. During this time, the war had a very strong impact on everyone. Thank you very much for your help, support is very essential when you start living anew. 


Katyryna Zayets

He has a son, Volodymyr Zhurba, born in 1965. The son has been disabled since childhood. During the occupation, they were in Bucha. During the "Hail" shelling, a shell exploded near the house. The windows were broken, the furnace was damaged, the foundation was sifted. Tamara lost her hearing from the explosion. She remembers almost nothing. Against the background of psychological stress, Parkinson's disease worsened.

Thanks to the funds received, the furnace was restored and a hearing aid was purchased. We have bought food and electricity equipment. Thank you!

It's challenging to cope with and provide for little children during these difficult times.

I am currently on maternity leave, so money is tight. The benefits I receive for the children are spent on essential needs in the first few days. When the war started, it became much harder to live because we had to leave our established place of residence and the support of nearby relatives





The Lebid Family

My name is Tanya, and I am from the city of Bahmut. I am a mother of two girls and after my divorce, I was left without housing and had to rent an apartment. When the war started, life became much harder for us. We faced difficulties with finances, housing, and constant shelling. It's very challenging to raise children on my own during these times without any support, and I struggle to make ends meet. Due to the situation in the country, prices in stores

are increasing by the minute. After being evacuated from the city, acquaintances took us in Pershotravensk. I work as a gas station operator, but my salary is low, and there are constant delays. I cannot change jobs at the moment because my child is in the second grade and requires more attention and assistance with learning through online education.





The Ponomarov Family

My name is Katerina. I am a mother of three children. I live with my elderly mother and the kids. My mother receives a minimum pension. I am a single mother to the two older children (I don't receive any support payments), and I haven't received child support for the youngest for three years.

When the war started, life became very difficult. We faced financial difficulties. It's extremely challenging to raise children nowadays without any support. Whatever I manage to earn is not enough for anything. There are no good job opportunities in the village, and I can't afford to travel to the city. Additionally, my children are attending online classes, which require assistance and attention.

My name is Nastya. I am a mother of three girls. We used to live together in a small urban-type settlement not far from where the military actions are taking place. Sometimes rockets would hit our area. When the war started, life became very scary and difficult. Prices in the stores skyrocketed. My husband's salary was cut by 30%. We decided to leave for

Western Ukraine. We encountered financial difficulties. My husband wanted to join the Armed Forces of Ukraine to provide for us and defend our land, but he was denied because he lacks military training. I am currently unable to work because the settlement is small and there is a lack of job opportunities.





Kondratenko Julie

I am Kondratenko Julie. I and my mother were displaced persons from Irpin in February 2022. We were moved to Kosiv. There in Kosiv we met you, when we were living in a school. You have us to listen to a song, that was written for us and we were all crying while listening to it. Then we told our open stories of war survivors and you listen to everyone very attentively. Then you gave us help.

My mother is very old, she is almost 96 years old.

But she is still ok. For her it was a great shock, to survive this all, tacking into account that has already survived one war, the Second World War. And it is awful that we in 21 century need to hide from bombs and air shelling.





The Kraynyuk Family

One day before the war (23.02)

My day was no different from other days, this day only my friends and I met for a walk, what topic did we talk with them? Of course, on the topic of "Will there be a war?", we didn't believe it at all (and I still can't believe it), but the answer to this question was already given the next day. The beginning of the war, the first day, 24.02

My morning did not start normally, but with panic from the fact that some explosions were already heard, and all the news reports said that the war had begun.





The Polikarpov family

We are a family of refugees from the Kyiv region. Our family consists of 5 people: three children, my husband, and me. At the beginning of the war, due to the shelling, we were forced to leave our home in the Kyiv region and move to Vynnyky, Lviv region. We are a large family, taking care of three minors aged 15, 10, and 5. My husband has a disability (Group 3), and I take care of our youngest son who has asthma and requires constant medical attention.

After the forced relocation, we have to rent housing since we cannot afford to return home as it is periodically shelled. We struggle to make ends meet and barely have enough for food and rent. We sincerely thank you for the assistance provided to us.





Rostyslav Martyniuk

My name is Rostyslav Martyniuk, my wife is Halyna. Together we have two minor daughters, Anastasia and Olga. In addition, we have two older daughters who are married and live separately. We have three grandchildren. Before the war, my wife and I worked in the tourism industry. I was the manager of the Oselya Hotel on Dragobrat (a ski resort), and my wife took

care of our estate, where we hosted people for family vacations. We built the estate together with my wife. Since the beginning of the war, we lost our income in the family business and I lost my job as a hired worker. For four months, we hosted refugees from Kharkiv, Kyiv, Odesa, and Zaporizhzhia at the hotel on Dragobrat.

We are the Kryvych family, who left our home and moved to another city. We left our home in Dnipropetrovsk region and relocated to Lviv. My husband is a military serviceman who is currently stationed in the east, defending our peace. We find ourselves in a foreign city, without jobs, without our own home, and without means of sustenance. We are extremely grateful for the assistance during this challenging time for us.

Thanks to your help, we were able to purchase essential items as we had left with nothing, and every month we buy groceries. We are very grateful to you, and may God bless and protect you!






The Nozdrachov Family




The Glyniani Family






The Gorbenko Family




The 'Strong Woman' Project (2 cards)






The Grynevych Family

Good day. My name is Kateryna Varchenko. Due to the war, I had to leave the country with my 2 children. I am the mother of 2 beautiful sons. currently i'm Spain. My husband remained in Ukraine, serving in the National Guard of Ukraine. Unfortunately, I do not have the opportunity to work now, so I am infinitely grateful to you for the financial assistance. Thanks to this money, my children have the opportunity to have a normal childhood. Thank you.



The Zhuravsky Family

A family of internally displaced persons from Toretsk, Donetsk region, found shelter in the same building on Naberezhnaya Peremogy, 118 in Dnipro. On January 14, 2023, a rocket attack was carried out on a residential building in Dnipro. As of January 17, there are 45 dead, including three children, and 75 wounded. A young family with children were in the church

during the rocket attack, unfortunately, their old mother (73 years old) stayed at home and died - the body, unfortunately, has not yet been identified.





Ihor Klymovych

Since February 24th, he has been involved in volunteering. He helps civilians, military personnel, and internally displaced persons by providing them with food, medication, and military equipment. Like the majority of Ukrainians, he is unemployed but continues to engage in volunteering. He owns a car that requires constant refueling, which helps Ukrainians during these challenging times. Thanks to your support, I am rescuing victims from war zones.

I am immensely grateful to you for the invaluable assistance you provide.





Andrey Pavlenko

Volunteer, evacuated people from the conflict zones, and manages assistance to affected families.





Oleg Kodatskyi

Our family left Mariupol in March of last year, and for the second year now, we have been renting an apartment in Lviv. We have two foster children, but this year we had to remove the older one, who is already 19 years old, from our family, and he is trying to live independently. He rents a room but still needs assistance. Our foster daughter, who is 14 years old, lives with us. We also live with my wife's disabled mother, who requires care.

Our biological children are adults now, with our daughter already married and our son serving in the Armed Forces. He is currently in the hospital due to a deterioration in his health resulting from the conditions of his service and requires further medical examination.





The Horban Family

Our family, Igor Gorban, 58 years old, Svitlana, 54 years old, and our mother, 72 years old, have two married children and seven grandchildren (in Kyiv). The war did not spare our family since 2014 when the Russian aggressor crossed the borders of Ukraine. It was already clear then that Russia's further actions meant war (unfortunately). Since that year, my wife and I started actively assisting the affected people.

However, fate led me (as the husband) to make a decision to defend Ukraine, to go to the frontlines and protect our land, and to safeguard the people in Eastern Ukraine. From spring 2014, I served in the Aidar Volunteer Battalion.






The Korbul Family

On February 24th, it felt like a nightmare, a terrifying dream. I woke up at 5 in the morning to strange sounds and started walking around the apartment. Everyone else was already awake. And then it felt like hell. My husband said it had begun... and he had to leave immediately. Tears flowed like water from a faucet. By 6:30 in the morning, my husband kissed me and the children, took his helmet, bulletproof vest, weapon, and set off to join his comrades.

For him, it was a familiar situation, as he had been fighting since 2015, defending our independent Ukraine. He knew how to conduct himself and what to do. He passed this experience on to us. So we quickly gathered our documents and left our home. In that moment, my heart shattered in half.





The Poddubny Family

I want to thank you from the depths of my heart for supporting volunteers here in Ukraine. It's incredible what we were able to do with your help. When the war started we couldn't work or study. But we couldn't do nothing either. It seemed that we owe to do something to help our citizens, our soldiers and country overall. That started our journey of buying groceries

and cooking meals for refugees, sending humanitarian aid for people on the East, providing orphanages that had to move from hot spots with needed things. Our typical day starts with planning, then packing, driving, sending. Your donations reached hundreds of victims of the war. And we can't say thank you enough for that. God bless you all.





Vyacheslav Smyslov

Vyacheslav Smyslov is a serviceman of the Armed Forces of Ukraine who sustained severe multiple injuries near Bahmut while shielding his commander, saving his life. In 2014, his family relocated to Mariupol during the occupation of Donetsk. From Mariupol, Vyacheslav was deployed to the front lines, participating in the liberation of Kherson. Immediately after the liberation of Kherson, their brigade was transferred to Bahmut, where he

he took part in the defense of Bahmut until he was injured in February 2023. Their family home in Mariupol was destroyed, and the Smyslov family, including Vyacheslav's three young children, disabled mother, had to move to Lviv for his treatment. Later, the family relocated to Uman.





The Stepantsov Family

My name is Svetlana and I am a mother of two children. Before the war, we lived in the city of Izium. The children are Stepanov Mykyta Vitaliiovych, born in 2006, and Stepanov Bohdan Vitaliiovych, born in 2007. My husband is Vitalii Anatoliiovych Stepanov, born in 1982. My mother is Olha Oleksandrivna Blokhivets, born in 1954, and she is disabled, requiring constant medication. Currently, we are in Zakarpattia, in the city of Tiachiv,

because we have nowhere to return to in Izium. Our home has been damaged and is uninhabitable. We are in need of assistance as we have to pay for accommodation during winter, and it is extremely difficult to access humanitarian aid. Finding work is also challenging.





Tetyana Zemlyak Family

Our family resides in the village of Bohdanivka in the Brovary district. Our village was occupied by the invaders. We didn't have a chance to leave. We went through all the horrors of war. When the shooting started, our family hid in the cellar. My husband, our three children, and my elderly mother were with me. We spent several days in the cellar. When everything quieted down and we came out of the cellar, we saw our house, barn, and car burning

burning down. We were left with nothing. Our kind neighbors took in our large family. Your assistance gave us the strength to endure and not lose our sanity. Your support was a miracle during this terrible time. We are incredibly grateful to you for this sacrifice for the sake of unknown people.





The Kashchuk Family

Our family lives in the village of Bohdanivka, Brovary district. Russian forces have occupied our village. Tanks were driving through the streets. We counted 20 tanks on our street. We started gathering our belongings. A neighbor called us to run and hide in the cellar. Our family took shelter in the neighbor's cellar. It was small, and there were 8 of us. The explosions were terrifying. The cellar was shaking. We thought it might collapse.

We stood almost the whole night because there was no space to sit. We were freezing and hungry. Later, we moved to another cellar where there was more room. I tried to ask the Russians for permission to go and get our belongings and food, but they didn't allow it.





The Anashchenko Family

We live in the village of Peremoha in Brovary district. The war started so abruptly that we could barely comprehend where to run and what to do. We had a large house and many animals. When the village began to be bombed, we hid in the cellar. But the bombings intensified, and it was announced that people would be evacuated. The Russians allowed us to come out of the cellar but didn't let us take our belongings.

Our family was taken away through a green corridor. We hoped dearly that our house would be preserved, and we worried about our animals. When we returned to our village after the occupation, our house was completely destroyed. The entire street was bombed.






The Babenko Family

The war began for Marina back in 2014. When the Russian invaders bombed the city of Donetsk, Marina Babenko was preparing lunch for her family. Rocket shrapnel hit their apartment directly, causing Marina to suffer shrapnel wounds in her arm and eye, which continue to have lasting effects to this day. This kind-hearted woman has endured tremendous suffering as a result of Russian aggression, and that was only the beginning of the hardships she

has experienced and continues to face today. Her husband passed away, and her only daughter was diagnosed with brain cancer. Marina and her daughter have now moved to a small rented apartment in Kyiv for her daughter's treatment, and all their money goes towards her chemotherapy.





The Byshovets Family

Vitalii Ivanovych Bishovets, from the village of Peremoha in Brovary district, Kyiv region. Vitalii Ivanovych wept when we handed him the card, expressing profound gratitude to the compassionate individuals and all those who sympathize with the victims of the war in Ukraine. A rocket hit his house, and he miraculously survived. His wife passed away, leaving him alone. He expressed his desire not to leave this place, where his life was, and where his

wife is buried. He is immensely grateful to the people who helped him during such difficult times. He cannot speak about the supportive people without tears in his eyes.





Natalija Kravchenko Family

Our family is from the Bachmut district. Brutal shelling forced us to flee to the Kyiv region. Our home has been destroyed. We are infinitely grateful to you for not leaving us alone in our hardship. Thanks to your financial support, we had food and all the necessities. We have shelter in this difficult period. The war continues, and we don't know what awaits us ahead, but today, thanks to you, we have everything we need. Thank you from the bottom of our hearts.



The Kardashova Family

The story of Lilia Kardashova is one of hardship and resilience. She grew up in difficult circumstances as an orphan in a children's home. From a young age, Lilia lived in inhumane conditions without electricity or running water. She rarely attended school and struggled with basic literacy skills. She was like a modern-day Mowgli, isolated from society. When her parents passed away, Lilia was sent to a children's home as her relatives refused to care

for her due to her developmental challenges. At the age of 13, volunteers visited the children's home and noticed Lilia, expressing a desire to help her. Over the course of four years, they worked on her social integration, which was an incredibly challenging and arduous process. Lilia had to learn how to read and master basic skills.





Galina Kalinichenko Family

I have to pay for my medical treatment. Winter has arrived, and without your help, I would simply freeze without heat. You rescue me from hunger and cold. The Pinak Family

Like all Ukrainians, my family was not prepared for war. It all happened unexpectedly. Our lives were completely shattered in an instant. Our only thoughts were on how to survive and protect our family. Our house was located near a military airfield, so the first bombings hit our neighborhoods. Left without shelter and work, we couldn't even imagine how we would live now. But God performed a miracle.

The Khytrykh Family

The story of Galina and Peter reflects the story of many Ukrainian families. They had a house, a farm, and a garden. They went to work and enjoyed their grandchildren. They helped their children build a house and planned for a peaceful retirement. But the war destroyed everything. Their house and the houses of their neighbors were demolished. How to start living again, what to do? ? Thank you very much!



Ruban Evgeniya

Good afternoon, we are the Ruban family, father Serhiy, mother Yevgenia, son Yevhen, daughter Olga. A year ago we left our native village in Zaporizzya region because we could not live in the occupation. Our journey was very difficult, we drove for 11 hours under shelling in fear for our children, where and when we are safe. We were accepted by Kolomyia, we live in a shelter. We were very lucky to meet in person Dell Loy Hansen, his wife Julie

and David and Shel Levitt. They helped a lot in a difficult time and we were able to buy clothes, shoes, glasses, the children's eyesight has worsened. They helped my husband a lot to who went to serve in the Armed Forces and needed to buy a uniform and shoes and a backpack.





Olga Korol

Olga Korol from Shevchenkove village, Brovary district. It has been six months, but the wound of losing my husband doesn't heal. Olga and her child were put on a bus and sent away from the village as soon as the war started. Her husband stayed behind, saying he would watch over the house and parents. Over a thousand Russian tanks entered the village. Russians entered people's homes, confiscated phones and food, and drove people out.

My husband and his brother hid in the basement. But after a few days, when the food ran out, he decided to reach his mother. However, as he approached the house, he and his brother were captured and taken to the center.





Nila Vergeles

My name is Nila my husband Timur our son Mark is 3.5 years old. The life of our family changed beyond recognition on February 24 when the invasion of the Russian Federation began. We live in Bucha along Lesnaya 16 street, which is adjacent to Vokzalnaya street near the Gostomel airport from which Russia started bombing our houses. On March 1, we decided to somehow get out through the village of Buzovaya, we decided to go along but

there were already tanks that blocked the highway. Our car in which I was driving, my husband and us son, he was only 3.5 years old, was shot from all sides. The husband was injured. But he was able to turn the car around. We hid in a dacha cooperative which was encircled.





Ludmila Yakovenko

My name is Lyudmila Yakovenko. Until 2014, I lived in Crimea with my husband and son. I taught the history of foreign literature at the institute. The husband was an entrepreneur, engaged in the production of outdoor advertising. After the occupation of Crimea, we were forced to leave everything and move to Ukraine. In 2019, they bought an apartment in Irpen,

but did not live there for long. Active combat events in Irpin began from the first day of the war. On February 27, several shells hit the house where my family and I lived. The roof, windows, walls were damaged.





Oleksandr Oliynyk

Good day! My name is Oleksandr, and I have three children: a 19-year-old daughter, a 6-year-old daughter, and a 2-year-old son. My family and I were living peacefully in a small village in the Bucha district near Kyiv. Unfortunately, on February 24, 2022, at 4:00 in the morning, we heard explosions, and our family had to leave our home. We traveled amidst rocket explosions and traffic jams, and it was very frightening, especially with our young children.

The next day, on February 25, 2022, we discovered that Russian forces had occupied the Bucha district. People who were still trying to leave Kyiv were shot on the road not far from our town. Then, on March 12, 2022, we learned that our home had been destroyed by the Russian occupiers.





The Deryuga Family

We are the Deryuga family. With the onset of the full-scale war in Ukraine, a helping hand in the form of financial assistance reached us from Del Loi, along with his wife Yulia and David Levit. Over a year, your monetary support has been directed towards the education of my five children, including private English tutoring, music school, acting school, art school,

and dance school. During this time, my children were well-clothed and received all the necessary vitamins for their proper development. And most importantly, we had electricity and managed to endure this harsh winter because we were able to provide ourselves with a generator.





The Bilonozko Family

We live in the city of Mykolaiv. Our city started getting bombed from the first days. I take care of three disabled individuals – my sister and son are disabled in the first group, and my elderly mother is very ill. We can't go anywhere. When the bombs fall, we don't even have the ability to run to shelter. We simply pray that God will protect us. When the sirens sound, my son screams as he suffers from a mental disorder.

Every day our city is being bombed. We have forgotten what a peaceful sleep feels like. The store where I worked was bombed. I lost my job, having to take care of three disabled individuals. Your financial support has literally saved our lives.






Yuri Khizhnyak Family

Before the war, my family lived in the city of Irpin. Since February 24, when the full-scale invasion of the Russian army into Ukraine began, we woke up in the morning to explosions. I will remember this terrible date for the rest of my life. It was impossible to believe what had happened. After the blowing up of the bridge over the Irpin River and the beginning of the fighting for Hostomel, the place where we lived was at the forefront of Kyiv's defense.

It was decided to leave. When the family was in a safe place I decided to return home. What I saw upon my return cannot be succinctly described. Burnt houses, dead people on the roadside. All this was etched in my memory for a lifetime.





The Lysenko Family

In 2017, Inna was diagnosed with breast carcinoma. During peacetime, we had enough funds for her treatment because both Inna and I were working. I had my own automobile maintenance station. Our son Ivan entered the National Aviation University (NAU), and Anton was studying in school. Later, Ivan made the decision to join the Armed Forces. And after 3 months, the war began...I stayed in Irpin because there were bedridden elderly

neighbors nearby, and there was no one else to take care of them except us. Ivan experienced the war in his unit in Vasilkov, Inna started working at the Kiev branch of a military hospital, and Anton initially stayed in Vinnitsa and later moved to my father in Rivne region.






The Chornovil Family

Good day. On that dreadful morning of February 24, when it all started, I must admit, we were in a state of shock and had no idea what to do. We were especially concerned for

for our children, aged 6 and 13. We decided to leave our city of Brovary on the second day, the 25th, because our city was located near Kyiv, which was the main target for the invaders. We realized that we all needed to survive!





The Sklyarevskyi Family

My family is from Mariupol. Words cannot express the horror that our family went through. The photos of our homes will tell a more vivid story. We are immensely grateful for your tremendous support during this time. We were able to find accommodation and purchase necessary items. We have been under your protection all this time. Our family is praying for you.



Sklyarevsky Valery

The war took everything from me. From the beginning of the war and the shelling of Mariupol, I was in my private house, not far from the Drama Theater, which was destroyed by the Russian military, I was with a friend. They bombed so that for two weeks we did not climb out of the basement at all, and it was impossible to fall asleep at night due to the continuity of air bombs, artillery and mortars. Once the Russian military came, there were

Chechens and Russians. They shot my dogs. They got me and a friend out of the filing, checked the documents, asked for the safe, apparently thought that I had money. After interrogation and inspection, we were sent to the lodge.





The Kovalev Family

On February 24, the war found me at work. I work in a kindergarten. The shelling of the outskirts of the city began. I ran home because I had to take my things and go to the children, they lived in the city center, at that moment it seemed that it would be safer there. When I ran to the house, the house had already suffered from hail strikes. With tears we went to the children. Chaos began, screams, corpses, burning, houses collapsed.

Light, gas, water disappeared. Under these conditions, they lived in an apartment with children on the 3rd floor, and they were in the same house, but on the 1st floor in the apartment of the parents of the son-in-law, since it was not safe to live with a small child on the 3rd floor.





The Lupeyko Family

We first heard the explosions, and later witnessed them from the window of our apartment. We decided to travel to western Ukraine until the situation stabilized. That's how the war began for us. We all expected that this senseless war would end in 2-3 weeks, but it has been going on for almost a year and four months now. The terror inflicted by the aggressors on Ukrainian soil knows no bounds, and the crimes against civilians are becoming

increasingly horrific. Familiar acquaintances invited us to temporarily stay in Lviv, with whom we had only communicated online before. We spent the first three months of the war in western Ukraine, relatively peaceful, and also found our best friends there.





The Chychykalov Family

Hello Dell Loy, Julia and David!

Although we have known each other for a year, I will start from the beginning. We are the Chichikalov family from the city of Dnipro. My name is Anna, I am 39 years old, my son Dmytro (who has bronchial asthma) and my grandparents. Unfortunately, my grandfather also underwent surgery for prostate adenoma (and now he will always have a catheter for urine).

I work as a cold water controller, my salary is 6700 UAH (less than the minimum subsistence level) and I do not live with my husband. Thanks to your financial support, we were not hungry, and every month we bought medicines without which Dmytro, his grandparents (blood pressure) cannot live, and I have repeatedly suffered from bronchitis (as we stayed in the bomb shelter for a long time).





The Vysogorets Family

My name is Tatyana, I am a mother of three children. When the war started, they were forced to leave the city of Pokrovsk and rent housing. They arrived in Petropavlivka, life became more difficult - financial difficulties, it is difficult to find a job. There is no support, what one manages to earn is not enough even for basic needs. Now I work in a store,

the salary is minimal, I cannot find another job, because there is no one to leave the children with. I learned about your organization and am receiving help. Thanks, now my children have food and clothes. This is a huge help for us.





Yurchuk Kateryna

I am Yurchuk Kateryna from Zhytomyr region On the 17th day of the war, March 12, 2022, volunteers took me and my sister, who was staying with me at the time, 600 kilometers from home to Prykarpattia. We were warmly welcomed here in Kosiv. They settled us in a school classroom. They fed us three times, then twice a day. 15 people lived in our class, then we were moved to other classes, because they were preparing the school for

children's education. My sister and I worked on creating a camouflage robe called "Kikimora", which was ordered by volunteers. Then we were all transferred to another school, 6 people lived in my room (former school classroom).





The Paleev Family

My name is Albina, I am a mother of three children. In connection with the war, there are no robots, there is not enough money to provide, the old grandfather and grandmother still live with us, we take care of them. I am always looking for a way to provide for my

children and as soon as there is a part-time job, I go without hesitation. It is not easy for us; ; children go to school, sometimes there is not even enough for simple notebooks. The only thing that saves us is that we live in a private house, we have our own garden and a small farm.





The Gerasimenko Family

Good afternoon. We are a large family from the Dnipropetrovsk region, we lived in Bakhmut, Donetsk region, when the war began, rockets began to fly in to us from time to time. Not wanting to risk our lives and the lives of our children (we have three of them), we decided to run away from the war somewhere! Because some of our documents were lost when they were gathering in puffs. We lived wherever we could (schools, dormitories, gyms).

Since my parents and my husband's parents are with us, they are elderly people, it is very difficult for us to find normal housing, there are no finances, some documents were lost, it is impossible to get full assistance from the state. Now we live in the village of Maryanovka, Ternopil region.





The Ageev Family

Good afternoon, my name is Lily. We are from the frontline village of Slobozhanskoye. There were enemy rockets arriving in our village and our house was partially destroyed. Miraculously, we weren't hurt. My parents and my two children were forced to leave because there is no way to restore housing, and the threat to life is very high.

My parents are disabled of the second group! And I'm in position. My husband left us and does not give any help. At the moment we live in a cold hostel where there are absolutely no conditions for a future newborn.





The Ponomaryov Family

Good afternoon, dear project organizers Dell Loya and team. Our Ponomaryov family is very grateful to you for your help in this difficult situation. Thank you for not remaining indifferent and helping us. In fact, this time is not easy and the money you give makes our unstable life easier. A full-scale war caught my family, like thousands of Ukrainians, by surprise. We are a large family from Kharkiv.

I am Halyna, I am 41 years old, my daughters are 21 and 19 years old, and my three sons are 14; 5 and 1.5 years. Decisions about where to go were approved on the way. In the end, they got to Lviv. They didn't leave right away,

because they believed that everything would end now, but when the month of March passed and everything only got worse, a month of basements, or in the corridor on the floor, children are constantly sick, from the cold and dampness, you can't get medicine, there is nothing to feed the children, my heart was torn to shreds with helplessness.





The Makarshyn Family

We are a family of immigrants from the Luhansk region. Makarshina Darya and Makarshin Dmytro and our daughter. I am the mother of a little girl, she is one year and 2 months old. My husband and the whole family are from the Luhansk region. For the second time since 2014, we were forced to flee our city, left everything there and left for Western Ukraine. Our city is now under occupation. The house where my husband, his mother,

and her brothers grew up was destroyed by enemy bombs. There are ruins left on the site of the house. Together with the house, our lives have been destroyed, because all the memories, photographs, things from my grandmother and my husband's grandfather, the trees and the garden were planted by my mother and her brothers when they were small.





The Kovalchuk Family

We are a family from Kyiv. From the very beginning of the war, they fled from constant shelling. They left all their property, work and left for a safe territory in the West of Ukraine. We rent housing, there is no stable work. Thank you for helping the families of Ukraine.

We are an ordinary family that lived a normal life near the city of Kyiv until this war began. We immediately ran west to our relatives, my husband sent us to friends in Barcelona, but we could not stay there for a long time, especially since the Military Commissariat obliged my husband to appear every week and he had to return closer to home, my daughters and I also returned from abroad Now we rent housing in the city of Kyiv itself.





The Kolisnyk Family

Good health. My children and I thank you very much for the help we receive from you. And this thanks will not cease even when this term of assistance ends. With your help, I am able to buy the children food, medicine, everything they need. Sometimes you even manage to help your mother and sisters a little, who also need help. The Stolba Family

My family returned from Transcarpathia to our hometown Pavlograd, Dnipropetrovsk region. We continue to serve people and children. Most recently, they were in the city of Pokrovsk in the Donetsk region, brought aid and held a holiday for children with disabilities. Despite the constant loud sounds of heavy weapons in the city, there are many civilian families in need of help.





The Suysit (Olena) Family
