My pension is very small. . I spend the entire pension on medication because

I have a chronic illness. I am so grateful to you for your help and support. It allows me to help my daughter and granddaughter. I was able to survive the winter. I humbly request that you do not leave me without your support. Thank you very, very much!





The Skorobogach Family

The war in Ukraine for our family began in 2014. Russian soldiers, together with separatists, violated the sovereignty of my country and occupied part of the territory of Donbass, including my city of Mariupol. On June 14, my father went to the market for groceries on a typical Saturday afternoon.


When he was crossing the bridge into the city center, he got into a shootout between the border guards of Ukraine and the separatists. His death is over. He pastored one of the largest Protestant churches in the city. At that moment, my family's life was turned upside down.





The Yatsenko Family

After the liberation of our village, we returned and were shocked by what we saw. The only consolation for us is that we are still alive and our children are safe. Galyna Daniel

Galyna Daniel,46 years old, from Luhansk, Ukraine. Dear Dell & Julia Loy and David Leavitt, let me express our sincere gratitude for your recent financial contribution to support us in our attempts to survive the hardships caused by the war in Ukraine - thanks to you it became possible! We already lost our houses 8 years ago due to civil unrest in the eastern part of Ukraine.

At that time, my little son was only 3 months old, he was born in March 2014, and in July we had to flee from our home town. We left everything in our house as if we went out for a moment - toys, children's books, little beds, and our other precious belongings - everything has been waiting for us since then.





Valery Sklyarevsky

Hello. My name is Valeriy Sklyarevskiy, and I am from Mariupol. The war started swiftly in my country, and we didn't have time to leave. There were constant bombings. I spent two months in the basement, enduring the cold, hunger, and burying the dead. We drank rainwater. In May, after spending two months in the basement of my own house and then the neighboring house, I managed to escape from my hometown and now I am in the capital city.

My house was burned down by Russian military forces, and my beloved dogs were shot. I have lost everything except for the miraculously surviving car, which barely got me to Kyiv. I am a pensioner and in desperate need of means to sustain myself.





Valentina Dolgova

We are residents of Borodyanka, both 70 years old. I am Valentina Vasilivna, and my husband is Vitaliy Oleksiiovych. Our house was destroyed by a fascist airstrike. We were left homeless, but thanks to your support, we are able to survive. My husband was losing his eyesight due to the nerve-wracking stress, but with your assistance, we were able to undergo surgery, and now his vision has greatly improved. Not even six months had passed when he started

experiencing severe abdominal pain. We called for an ambulance, and he was taken to the intensive care unit as his ulcer had burst. An emergency surgery was performed. We are so grateful for your support; without you, it would have been a very tragic ending. In the spring, we took up gardening, plowed the land with a tractor, and planted crops.










The Yermak Family

Hello! We are the Yermak family from the Zhytomyr region, a small but picturesque town called Mlyn in the Korosten district. On February 24, 2022, our morning began with a horrifying news: the war had started! It was unimaginable, but the rockets flying over our town towards Kyiv were a terrifying proof. We felt the paralyzing fear. There was no panic, only a little child in our arms who was just 9 months old at the time. A mother's heart was torn apart,

searching for the right decision. We needed to leave for a safe place. Since our family didn't have a car, we rented transportation. We took only the necessary warm clothes and documents. We headed west, to an unknown destination, just to be safe. We traveled under intense shelling, passing through checkpoints.





Volodymyr Bovsunovsky

Hello. My name is Volodymyr. My wife and I live in the village of Bilotserkivka, near Kyiv. Our morning on February 24 started at 6 o'clock. We woke up to the sounds of explosions. Realizing that the war had begun, we called our children. Our daughter, her husband, and their two children (six and one and a half years old) live in Kyiv on the 16th floor. The nearest shelter was far away, and with two children and non-functioning elevators, it was inaccessible.

Our son-in-law is a rescuer, and he was called to duty an hour before that, so our daughter was left alone at home with the children. Helicopters flew over us all day, and it was very loud... It was only at night that we managed to go to Kyiv and bring our daughter and grandchildren to our place. We thought it would be safer outside the city.





Kozhukh Svitlana

On February 24, explosions were already happening - my husband, our little daughter who was 11 months old, and I were fleeing. We didn't have our own car, but thankfully, we were given a ride ? It was scary because we were traveling in the dark, hearing something flying low above us and smelling gunpowder, but we couldn't see what it was. We were running towards the border with Romania, in case there was a need to cross it on foot.

For over two months, we lived in a village in Zakarpattia with strangers, where our daughter celebrated her first birthday. Unfortunately, I have a chronic condition - gallstone disease. I have 15 stones in my gallbladder, and my condition worsened significantly from that same day - February 24. Every week, and then even more frequently, I experienced gallstone attacks.





Rynat Pisarev

This will be a lifelong memory of February 14, 2022. We were at a photoshoot... happy, joyful, and very cheerful. And for us, it's a memory of how God protected us from February 24 to March 14. In 19 days, we learned a lot about how to survive in Mariupol under these conditions. Hiding from shelling, procuring food and essentials for 12 family members,

eating sparingly when four children want something more or something tasty... explaining that we can't afford certain things at the moment. The joy of communication when you meet brothers and sisters from the church, friends, relatives, acquaintances, sharing information because there is no phone connection, or if there is, only in certain places.

Gennady Kalinichenko








Kolisnyk Serhii

Volynets Svitlana

My name is Svitlana Viktorivna Volynets, born on February 26, 1965, in Kyiv. During the full-scale war, my husband and I took care of children's homes and rehabilitation centers "Sesenkiv" in Brovary district. On February 24, 2022, our lives changed forever. It seemed to me then that this was not real, but some kind of dream and I could not wake up.

With our previous experience of 10 years in charity and volunteering work with children, we immediately joined as volunteers. When the full-scale armed aggression by the Russian Federation against Ukraine began, in a state of martial law, our team started evacuating children from the occupied territory, including the children's home where we served. Russian tanks entered the Brovary district. People lived under occupation for a month, enduring constant tank shelling and rocket bombardment. It was sheer horror, as described by eyewitnesses. We, as volunteers, entered the de-occupied villages after a month, on the second day following the defeat of the invaders.





Rimma Schukailo

I am 76 years old, and I am from Mariupol. My house burned down completely. It's terrifying to become homeless at 76. During the bombings and street battles, my daughter's husband managed to evacuate me with a broken leg from an apartment that had no electricity, no heating, and not even windows. In Kyiv, I have my daughter. They live in a rented place, and before the war started, they bought a small apartment in Bucha and

were renovating it, hoping to move into their own home in the spring. But then the war came! After the occupiers left Bucha, there was no livable space left in the apartment!





The Melnychenko Family

We, the Melnychenko family, live in the village of Chernobaivka near Kherson. We lived under occupation for 8 months as we had no opportunity to leave. We experienced shelling with casualties and destruction. However, we believed in the imminent liberation. It has been two months since we were liberated, but the shelling hasn't stopped, only intensified,

resulting in more casualties and destruction. In such difficult conditions, the help of acquaintances, and especially unfamiliar people, helps us survive. Humanitarian aid arrives constantly. Your assistance has been a miracle for us! We never thought that there are people who feel the pain of others as their own. We are immensely grateful to you. Thanks to you!





Evgena Kaminska

I am a pensioner. A few years ago, my daughter passed away, and her son was left in my care. And then one trial followed another. I ended up in the hospital and had surgery. While I was in the hospital, the shed with livestock burned down. My husband's heart stopped due to stress. He passed away. A few months later, the war began. I was in despair. But then Maria Vashchenko called me and told me about the program.

This financial support was like a blessing from above. We are infinitely grateful to you, Del Loy and Julia, for your kindness and generosity. I pray for you and your family endlessly.





The Zabolotnykh Family

We are the Zabolotnykh family from the city of Mariupol. I have a son who is 4 years old and my niece of 12 years old. We left and took her from the occupied territory. Leaving was very difficult, almost impossible, as the city was

constantly shelled. Our home was destroyed, and we miraculously survived. We have nowhere to live, and currently, we are staying in Kyiv. Our elderly parents and my niece also left with us. Your program is a tremendous blessing for our entire family. We are immensely grateful to you.






The Holub Family

The Klymenko Family

A mother of multiple children, raising three boys on her own in the city of Maryinka, Donetsk Oblast. Their story is not an easy one, as in 2015, their house was hit by a projectile for the first time. Over the course of seven years, the house was gradually rebuilt, and in December of their 21st year, they returned home, lived there for two months, and then the war resumed. "It was very scary; the bombings started heavily during the day, and the

children were at school." The next morning, the entire country began to be shelled, so she took the children and went to a village near Maryinka, where they stayed for a month until it became unbearable. "The whole house was shaking, and the surrounding houses were on fire."





Senyk Tamara

Tamara Senyk is an 84-year-old pensioner who is seriously ill. She has been bedridden for 5 years. When the war started, her relatives with children had to leave. However, thanks to your assistance, two wonderful women take care of her, and she has the means for medication and food. During the winter, when there was no heating, a generator was purchased with your support. This allowed her to have warmth and water in her home.

Your help is a heavenly miracle that has blessed this elderly woman. She is grateful to God for you. May God bless you for your love for people and care.





The Baklan Family

We are a young family from Pavlohrad. We got married two years ago and were planning our happy life together. 


The Trenogin Family




Olena Zraychenko

In the opposite direction, I have been delivering humanitarian aid (food, hygiene supplies, clothing, and shoes for refugees, food for animal shelters). Prior to the war, I worked

as a film and television operator. However, with the onset of the full-scale invasion, the projects I was working on were shut down, leaving me unemployed. In order to achieve victory over the Russian aggressor, I had to retrain myself as a driver.





Dmytro Vivchariuk

My name is Dmytro Vivcharyuk! I am a Ukrainian theater and film actor. Since February 24, 2022, my life, like the lives of many Ukrainians, has changed. We woke up at 5:06 in the morning to the noise and explosions. We live near Zhuliany Airport. I have two children and a wife. My eldest son has autism. On that unusual morning of February 24, he reacted very nervously, and everyone was scared. Chaos, panic, explosions, horrifying news...

I made the decision to evacuate my family to Western Ukraine. Later, they went to Germany because I wasn't sure it was safe to stay in Ukraine. After I put my family on the bus, I started rescuing and helping whoever I could. I transported people, children, animals to Western Ukraine or to the border with neighboring countries.





Lyudmila Kovalenko

Lyudmyla Stepanivna Kovalenko and her daughter Iryna. Before the war, we lost our support and strength - my husband and father. A terrible illness took him away from us. Then a horrible war began. We live in the city of Brovary. During the full-scale invasion of the occupiers, we were among the first to hear the consequences of the war when our city was hit by the first air attacks. I am a pensioner and have one daughter.

She lost her job, and we were left with nothing. Times are tough, but I am confident that with acts of kindness, things will get better in the future. Thanks to caring individuals, we are still managing to stay afloat.

My husband and I lived in the city of Mariupol. We loved our beautiful city, but we were forced to leave, and at the moment, we are living in the Chernivtsi region, Kelmenetsky district. Both my husband and I are pensioners with minimal pensions, and it's very difficult for us during the war. We have lost everything. We took only the most essential things with us. Now we are trying to start our lives anew in this new place.




Gutareva Tamara

From February 24, 2022, until May 30, 2022, we lived with our family in the occupied city of Oleshky in the Kherson region, and we made the decision to leave for the controlled territory because it was very frightening for the children. We attempted to leave twice, but there were battles everywhere. On the third attempt, we left through Vasylivka in the Zaporizhia region and arrived in Zaporizhia at night. We spent the night in a kindergarten and

then headed to the city of Mykolaiv. However, it was unsafe to stay there as the city was under shelling, so we traveled to Kyiv, where our relative aunt lives. She provided our family with a free one-bedroom apartment, which we later upgraded to a two-bedroom apartment that we rent with our own funds.





The Khortovych and Sergiyeva Families

We are a large family residing in the village of Sloboda in the Chernihiv district. Russian forces were stationed in our village, and our houses have been destroyed. We didn't have the financial means to relocate anywhere. Without your assistance, we are unable to rebuild our homes. We are extremely grateful to you for your support during this challenging time. We are able to provide food and necessary supplies for our children, but

we kindly request help in restoring our buildings. We sincerely appreciate your support.





Yury Kharkovets

Our "House of Mercy" is located in the village of Boyarka, and before the war, we took care of the homeless, helping them start a new life. The Russian troops stopped right before our village, which saved us. However, the war brought new painful problems to our center. People from the combat zone started being brought to our center—families whose lives were destroyed

by the war and who lacked the means to rent accommodation. Our center has many needs. We are grateful to "Zoria Miloserdia" represented by Maria Vashchenko and the sponsors of the Del Loy and Julia Henson program for supporting the affected people. With these funds, we provide for the needs of several families. We are immensely grateful to you for your help.





The Shcherbyna Family

Our village was occupied by the rashits. There were many tanks in the village, and fierce battles were fought. Many of our boys were killed by the Russians. Lesia Ovdienko








Andrii Maystrenko






Inna Shevchenko

I have got injurines that do not let me work. Has already had 7 surgeries and need a couple of more. Money is required for medical treatment and living. I also take care of my parents who has lost their home in Irpin when missiles attacked the city.





Kostiantyn Molochnyi

My name is Serhiy Lytvyn, I am Kosya's father. My son was in Kharkiv and was injured. Now he requires a long term rehabilitation after the trepanation. He learns to speak. Amnesia is also a big problem.





Oleksandr Hlushko

I cannot work for a living having hard injuries. Need costful medical treatment. For now the doctors forecast at least 6 months to recover.





Tymur Holik

I have had a range of surgeries. Need a costful long term treatment. I also must keep the family.





Oleksandr Martyniuk

Due to injuries I can hardly walk. I have lost tens of close people and need psychological rehabilitation. My parents and my kid depend on me as well.






Volodymyr Miasoedov

I have a serious problem with my left arm. It doesn't move. Doctors are not sure if it overcome one day. But for now, I need expensive treatment. At the same time, there is no chance to work having only one arm.





Taras Peliukh

I received injuries of spine and abdomen and became an invalid after this war. Need to live, take medicines all the time and somehow help my family.





Tetyana Tatarintseva

Do you know what means to pack your whole life in a couple of bags? What means to change your lifestyle, your residence, your attitude to those you loved, your priorities. We had so many relatives and friends in Russia.





Serhiy Mitofir

Both legs and an arm are broken. War is cruel. Sometimes it is better to die than to live, like this... I still hope for recovery. And until then I need help to start walking at least.





Artur Redchyts

My both legs are injured. I am ready to make efforts and do everything depending on me to return to help our army. I want to be useful, want to feel alive. And now I cannot, not being able to move without help





Kostiantyn Shevchenko

I left the battle field thinking that it was nothing, just an arm. Now I know that my understanding of the situation was so naif. It is a painful and quite serious injury, that does not let me sleep at night without pills.





Anton Mukhin

My arm and leg are wounded. Some pieces of metal are still inside. I hope it is all over soon. And I can start rehabilitation to feel healthy. Will really appreciate if you support me now, when I am weak.





Svitlana Popova

I am a teacher. We were both teaching before the war. First, we could not believe that Russians could really attack civilians. But then the missile ruined our house. We were next to it, thanks God. Then the tank arrived and tried to kill us trying to take some things from the burning house.



Serhiy Prokopiv

I was shot on February, 25. Only a week ago my doctors decided I can live at home. Having serious injuries of the abdomen I cannot earn for living. I have a family and a little daughter. I would be happy if I did not feel guilty that much for not being able to buy everything my beloved ladies need.

I have several months ahead to recover. Walking is so painful. After a range of surgeries I still need treatment. Rehabilitation and medicines are not free for people defending the country. Perhaps, not enough money and the state cannot take care of people like me.

Our house in Kozarovychi was ruined. We have 3 kids, two of them are yet babies. Now we have to rent an apartment. My husband succeeded to find a job finally. But it is not enough to cover all the expenses.





Yanina Kholodkova

We live in Bucha region, Moshchun village. After deoccupation our house turned to be completely uninhabitable. I have two little kids to take care of. We do not have home for now. It requires much money to be rebuilt.





Ihor Nepevnyi

Moshchun, Bucha area. No electricity, no house. 2 little kids and wife. We both are trying to work, but we have much more spendings than income. Trying to rebuild our home. We need to arrange some warm space before winter comes.





Olha Zarytska

Kuchari. We have 3 kids. Our house was ruined. We lived in a tent. Then we were given a house on wheels. We face problems with work.





Olha Kononchuk

Dymer. We were in occupation. Russian army took my husband and my sister's husband. They never returned. We are waiting... We live in the house where russians stayed. I have 3 kids, one of them is still a baby.





Iryna Dudnik

We live in Ukraine, Mykolaiv. On the 25 of March 2022 during the shelling of our city by cluster shells by Russian army, my husband was wounded in the stomach and our house was hardly destroyed. From the 25 of March till the 14 of August my husband was at the hospital.





Nataliia Shevchenko

A family that is currently raising 10 adopted children. In 2014, they and their five adopted children were evacuated from Semenivka (Donetsk region), where fighting was going on, their house was damaged and became uninhabitable.





Fomintseva Mariia

I am from Horenka. My house is in ruins. A usual Ukrainian story nowadays. Nothing special. I just have to survive in new realities.





Tkachuk Yuliya

My home in Buzova was ruined. My angel had a break that day, I guess. After what happened I doubt if there is something that can make me suffer even more. Nothing left. All my life in ruins.





Iryna Buzan

Mother of two children. The world turned upside down for this family in February 2022, when Russia began razing their Mariupol. Having survived inhuman conditions of survival, betrayal (her brother and husband switched to the side of evil).





Nadiya Karnaukh

The Karnaukh family took in 10 adopted children. In Sloviansk, they had a large house where the family lived. When a full-scale war began and the Russians began shelling their city, they quickly gathered their children and moved to the city of Dnipro.



Olesia Fabrovan

In 2014 I learnt what the war was. I did not like it. So, my beloved Donbas became a stranger to me and my family. A lot of time passed before I got used to a new place, even longer before I could call Moshchun my home...





Inna Zholudenko

I have no home. I used to live in a cozy house in one of the most beautiful places of Kyiv region, Moshchun. I have a little room left from my house, kind people repaired it and this is the only place I live, sleep, cook... I am not the only one who lives this way.



Sasha Bohdanchuk

My house in Moshchun can be reconstructed. Good news. But my mum never... I wish I have lost the house in stead. My granny has mental disorders. I take care of her. She is my only family now...





Lyudmyla Smolyha

My dear Moshchun was so green and beautiful. I loved it with all my heart. Where else would you feel that close to nature. No Kyiv rush, no crowdy streets. Now my life is lonely and cold. My house was ruined, my husband and son are fighting for our freedom, for our right to live... Freedom is not free.





Hanna Znachkivska

I am a pensioner. It is the age, when you are not able to move to another place even if it is much better, cause your roots are too deep where you are. And now... All is left are my roots, as my home is in ruins.





Nadiia Shvets

Do you know what is the worst thing that can ever happen to parents? Yes. To live longer than your kids. But, when it is some natural process you at least can understand and accept it. We have lost our son. Russians came and killed him. Our house is in ruins as well.



Oksana Voloshyna

Oksana is a divorced mother of two teenage sons. She lost her job because of war, but anyway has to support her parents from Kharkiv, who are internally displaced persons in Kyrovograd oblast now. Oksana is a volunteer.





Andriy Chubuk

An employee of the State Emergency Service, was blown up by a mine during demining in the Kyiv Region, Vyshgorod District, and was injured in the leg. As of now permanent operations, walks on crutches.





Olha Didich

I am a pensioner. I live in Kozarovychi. I was never rich, but when russians came I understand I had been. They came to my house and took everything they could carry. I thought that was it. Now I will stay in my empty house.





Yuliya Belenuk

The house was looted, damaged during hostilities, temporarily out of work, it is impossible to find a job in the village of Kozarovichi. Three teenage children.





Olha Donchuk

Kozarovychi. Six people (wife, husband, mother, father and two minor children) live in a dormitory. The house was destroyed during hostilities and occupation. There is no work.





Tanya Pavlusenko

The child is disabled: incurable Duchenne disease (the boy does not walk). They did not leave the village during the occupation, they constantly needed medicine. The need for specific medicines is up to UAH 50,000 per month.






Yuriy Honchar

The house was destroyed as a result of hostilities, the pensioner lives in the garage.






The Tikhonyuk Family

As a result of the fall of the Russian helicopter, the pensioners' house burned down. They live in temporary adapted premises.






Sabrina Manukian

A broken house during hostilities, sat in the basement with her granddaughter during the bombings.






Volodymyr Politunov






Lyubov Klimenko

After the invasion of Russian troops, during shelling, I with my family were in a bomb shelter, and 03.03.22 we left Kharkov for the countryside. There was no food in the stores and no fuel at the gas stations. We survived as best we could.

My name is Valentina Taran and I lived in Kharkov with my family till invasion of Ukraine by Russian troops on 24.02.2022. Together with my husband worked as entrepreneurs but due to the military actions in Kharkov my family had to leave the house and evacuate to a safer place.



Liudmyla Kosheleva

Before Russia started the war against Ukraine I used to live and work in the small village called Andriivka in Balakleysky district, Kharkiv region. From dawn to dusk Russian troops pounded the city with tanks, artillery, Grad rockets, mortars, and, allegedly, cluster bombs.





Serhii Drobiazko

Before the start of a full-scale invasion of the aggressor's country, I worked as a dentist in one of the private clinics in Kharkiv. On February 24, the clinic where I worked closed and I decided to volunteer at the Kharkiv Regional Blood Center.





Tetyana Galaxyk

I am from the Kherson region. At the moment, we are left without a house, now we live in the city of Kyiv, I have five children who need to be clothed and fed. at the moment.



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Tetyana Rossina

I have diabetes with a complication on the thyroid, nerve endings and joints. I'm struggling, but stress and fear amplify my problems. Unreal pain. Sometimes hard to move without help.





During the 22-23 year of the program, the Levitt Institute and the Hansen Family Foundation procured medications, medical supplies, consumables, painkillers, and dressing materials for military hospitals and clinics in Ukraine. The hospitals were provided with expensive antibiotics, the use of which allowed saving the limbs of wounded soldiers and civilians.



Furthermore, the card-based financial program enabled the provision of military medics with a complete range of specialized tools for rescuing soldiers on the front lines of the Armed Forces of Ukraine in the advanced frontline positions.



Family Mylenkiy Sergiy

Good afternoon, I'm Mylenkyi Serhii Oleksandrovych, I live in the village of Kolychivka with my family, my wife and two minor children. We bought a house a year before the war, on March 7, 2022, our house was destroyed by Russian shells, and so we were left without a home. We are rebuilding as best we can, thanks to volunteers.

The Kostyuchenko family house, a family of 6 people, completely burned down, now they live with relatives. There are 2 disabled people in the family, an elderly sedentary grandmother. They dream to fulfill, they will be grateful for any help.

We, the Slyusar family, disabled pensioners, were under occupation in our native town of Irpin, left homeless as a result of Russian aggression. We are very grateful for the financial assistance we receive from you. Thank you for supporting us in difficult times for Ukraine and our family.

Hello. My name is Alexander, and my wife's name is Olena. We have 10 children. We are refugees from the Gornostaevka village in the Kherson region. We used to live at 45 Vasiliy Khodos Street.
